- 5 Cosumnes River Watershed Resiliency Multi Benefit Project- Austin Miller, Environmental Specialist, Sacramento County Department of Water Resources

The Cosumnes River flows for approximately 80 miles out of the Sierra Nevada Mountains to the Mokelumne River. The Cosumnes Watershed covers approximately 950 square miles. During heavy rain the river is very "flashy" and floods surrounding areas as the levees are not extensive. In 2023, floods in the watershed caused 3 deaths.

Local partners and state/federal agencies are coordinating to find solutions to flooding in this area. The California Department of Water Resources identified this watershed as a potential groundwater recharge project and did a pilot study using

an ecoFIP tool to create a model of the Cosumnes as it flows through Sacramento County. Weather event scenarios are played out using possible solutions to solve the flooding. Multi benefits to this project include mitigating flood risk, while increasing groundwater recharge and enhancing habitat.

Governor Newsom signed an Executive Order allowing flood waters to be diverted without a water right and used to recharge groundwater during flooding and excess water conditions. Diversion must involve existing infrastructure, a fish screen and not impact other water rights. Rancho Murietta CSD has been proactive in pursuing diversion of flood water to adjacent land for groundwater recharge under this Executive Order.

A list of 6 concept projects was developed for the watershed area involving:

- Utilizing existing side channels to funnel water to an appropriate field site
- Utilizing existing gravel and sand pits from prior mining sites along the river
- Identify ag sites in key spots along the river to bleed flood waters into by degrading levee

The Blodgett Dam removal project will recontour the floodplain, successfully allowing fish passage for spawn upstream for the first time in several years. Braided channels will be improved and a berm degraded to allow waters to divert and flood surrounding fields and flow back to Deer Creek.

The County will be focusing on the Wilton Road Floodplain Reconnection project. This project would protect the Wilton Road Bridge which is key to connecting the area, reduce the flood level by a foot and capture water for groundwater recharge. The Cosumnes River was included in the Water Resources Act of 2024 making it eligible for federal funding.

The Army Corps of Engineers has now surveyed all 800 levees in the region and created a list of levees to address first.

6 Groundwater and Sustainability Update- Chris Hunley, Groundwater Sustainability Manager, Sacramento County Department of Water Resources

There are four groundwater subbasins in the Sacramento Region with multiple Groundwater Sustainability Agencies managing different areas. The subbasins vary in groundwater stability. Some of the subbasin areas use more surface water than groundwater so the subbasin levels have increased, and the opposite is true for other subbasins. There will be a fee hearing to approve fees for cost recovery for Groundwater Sustainability Agencies.
