### What's the problem?


- Existing ESA and Clean Water Act permitting -- inefficient, costly, time consuming
- Mitigation lands increasingly scarce
- Lousy conservation
- USFWS shifting priorities to HCPs




## Current Permitting Process



### South Sacramento Constraints

- Significant vernal pool loss over time
- Mitigation constraints in Mather Core
   Recovery Area Sun Ridge ROD
- SSHCP eases burden

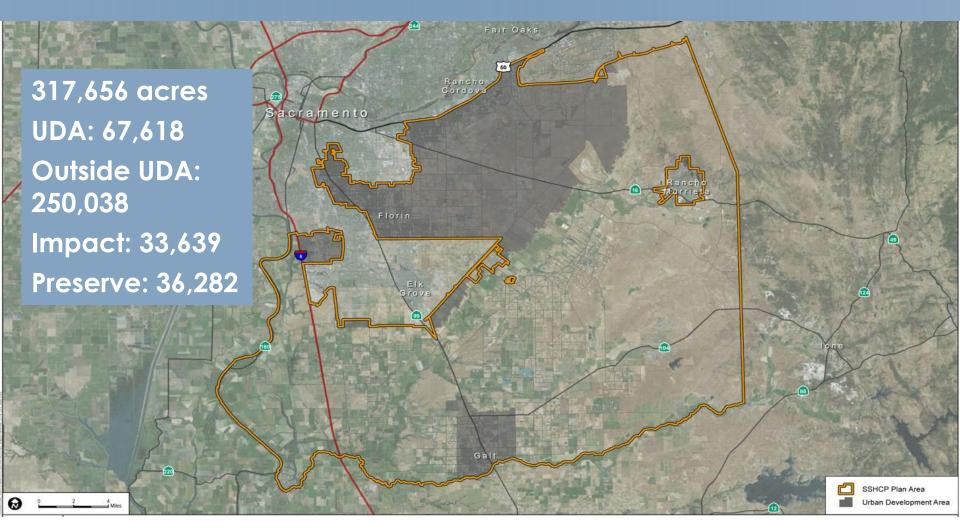


### SSHCP Addresses Issues

- Partnership of local agencies
- Covers 318,000-acre area
- Streamlines permitting from 5 federal and state agencies
- Covers 28 species and wetlands
- Saves time, reduces cost, achieves better conservation

# Integrated Federal/State Permit Solution

- Endangered Species Act Section 10 incidental take (federal)
- Clean Water Act Section 404 (federal)
- Endangered Species Act Section 2081 incidental take; Master Streambed Alteration Agreement (state)
- Clean Water Act Section 401; Porter-Cologne (federal/state)



### Plan Components

- 50-year ESA and CESA take permits
- Conservation strategy protecting 28 species
- Regional Aquatic Resources Program (Clean Water Act Sections 404 and 401)
- EIS/EIR
- Mitigation/in-lieu fee program
- Ordinances




## Conservation Strategy

- Large interconnected preserves:
   "hard line" inside UDA, "soft line"
   outside UDA
- Protects natural communities
- Builds from existing preserves
- Minimizes edge effects

# Aquatic Resources Program/Corps Permit Strategy

- Landscape-level watershed protection
- Streamlined Clean Water Act Section 404 permit process
- Linked to local entitlement process and ESA compliance



## Financing

- Combined mitigation/in-lieu fees calculated by impacts to "land cover" types
- Positive results vs. status quo for onramp projects

### Implementation

- South Sacramento Conservation Agency (JPA)
- Implementing and wetlands protection ordinances ensure compliance
- Early acquisitions "jump start" preserve system



### Public Outreach

- Public comment period, June 2 to Sept. 5 2017
- 18 workshops:
  - Five CPACs
  - ECOS, North State BIA, Sacramento County Farm Bureau/Cattlemen's Assoc., Sacramento Metro Chamber
  - Sacramento County Planning Commission,
     Sacramento Environmental Commission
  - Community workshops: Wilton, Galt, Rancho Cordova
- Dozens of meetings with individual stakeholders



### Stakeholder Feedback

- State and federal agencies strongly supportive
- Environmental, development groups supportive
- Ongoing outreach with landowner/ farming community



### SSHCP Adoption Schedule

- Public workshops & outreach: June 2017 September 2017
- Respond to comments, prepare final HCP, EIS/EIR, ARP: September 2017-February 2018
- Local agency hearings & adoption –
   February 2018-May 2018
- Submit for permit issuance June 2018
