# <u>Regulatory Drivers</u>

#### AB 1826 (Sept 2014):

- requires businesses that generate a specified amount of organic waste per week to arrange for recycling services
- requires each jurisdiction, on and after January 2016, to implement an organic waste recycling program to divert organic waste from businesses

# Regulatory Drivers

AB 341: 75% recycling "goal"

 To reduce GHG emissions by diverting commercial solid waste to recycling efforts and to expand the opportunity for additional recycling services and recycling manufacturing facilities in California.

# <u>Regulatory Drivers</u>

### AB 32 GHG scoping plan

 AB 32 requires reduction in GHG emissions to 1990 levels by 2020

# <u>Regulatory Drivers</u>

AB 1594: anti-ADC bill

the use of organic material as alternative daily cover (ADC) does not constitute diversion through recycling and will be considered disposal.

### <u>Outreach</u>

- 13,000 commercial generators
  - 30% contract for recycling services
  - 1% contract for organics services

# Collection infrastructure

- Monthly meetings with haulers
  - Develop regulatory consensus
    - Generators to include organics
    - Haulers to provide services
    - Facilities to be certified
  - Coordinate on outreach

#### **Organic Waste Toolbox**

As of January 1, 2016, commercial waste generators must comply with AB 1826 and establish programs for the diversion of organic waste. For most businesses, this includes food waste as well as landscaping waste. Resources are available below to assist in developing programs and insure compliance with AB 1826 and SWA Code requirements.

Every business is subject to the new requirements. According to preliminary CalRecycle data, the largest generators are food & beverage stores, services, restaurants and multi-family dwellings.


