COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

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NOTEWORTHY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA) Audit

The triennial audit of EMD's CUPA Program was performed by representatives from the California Environmental Protection Agency (CalEPA), the California Emergency Management Association (Cal EMA) and the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE). The audit team reviewed EMD policies, procedures, business files, inspection reports, return to compliance documents, complaint reports, and other documents. A few minor deficiencies identified during the audit are currently being corrected. CUPA is comprised of the following regulatory programs—California accidental release, hazardous materials, hazardous materials plans, hazardous waste, underground and aboveground storage tanks. EMD was recognized for "Outstanding Program Implementation" in the areas of enforcement and enforcement revenue credit. EMD was also recognized for participation in organizations, workgroups, technical advisory groups and committees, and implementation of a Facebook page.

COMPLIANCE ASSISTANCE, WORKSHOPS AND OUTREACH

Hazardous Materials Business Plan (HMP) Workshops

One HMP workshop was held with five businesses in attendance.

Food Safety Education (FSE)

Four FSE classes were conducted in November with 32 participants representing 10 facilities. Two classes were conducted in Spanish, one class was conducted in English and one class was conducted in Korean.

Body Art Industry Meeting

EMD Director Val Siebal hosted a meeting of body art industry stakeholders to discuss implementation of AB 300, a newly adopted law regulating body art establishments. The new law will take effect on July 1, 2012. Approximately 60 individuals participated in the meeting which provided a forum for distribution and discussion of information pertaining to the newly approved body art regulations.

PROCESS IMPROVEMENT AND COLLABORATION

Onsite Wastewater Treatment Systems

EMD Director Val Siebal presented, and the Board of Supervisors approved a Resolution critical of the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) for the overly restrictive proposed policy on Onsite Sewage Treatment Systems. A letter was subsequently sent to the SWRCB suggesting constructive alternatives to the proposed policy.

California Food Safety Policy Committee

Environmental Health Division Chief John Rogers and ECD Deputy Chief Alicia Enriquez attended a meeting of the California Food Safety Policy Committee held in Sacramento. Items discussed included statewide disease outbreaks, a recent raw milk recall and emerging issues surrounding the direct marketing of farm products. Representatives from statewide environmental health jurisdictions, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the California Department of Public Health were in attendance.

Sacramento Environmental Commission (SEC)

EMD Director Val Siebal and Executive Secretary Vicki Kloock provided staff support to the November 21st meeting of the SEC. Juli Jensen, the new County Agricultural Commissioner, reported on functions of the Agricultural Commission/Weights and Measures Department. Ms. Jensen also reviewed the 2010 Sacramento County Crop & Livestock Report. Colleen Heck, Senior Staff Attorney, State of California, Department of Toxic Substances Control, shared information on the renewed goal of the Green Chemistry Initiative to ensure safe consumer products.

Bay Area Medical Waste Advisory Group

Environmental Specialist (ES) Lea Gibson participated in a teleconference meeting of the Bay Area Medical Waste Advisory Group. The Group is comprised of representatives from city, county and state agencies who meet periodically to discuss medical waste legislation and enforcement of the Medical Waste Management Act.

California Restaurant Association

EMD Director Val Siebal attended a meeting of the California Restaurant Association and was introduced to several key members of the Association. Several Association members participate in EMD's Food Industry Working Group.

EMPLOYEE TRAINING

Hazardous Waste Training Seminar

Several EMD staff members attended in depth training on the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) presented by McCoy and Associates, Inc. RCRA is the 1976 federal law which governs the disposal of solid waste and hazardous waste. The training was hosted by the San Joaquin County Environmental Health Department who received grant funding from the Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA) Forum Board.

Biology And Control Of Vectors

EMD Director Val Siebal welcomed instructors from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention who provided a two-day training course on the Biology and Control of Vectors. Attendees received information on the various characteristics and habitats of many common vectors, including cockroaches and bed bugs encountered during environmental health inspections. The principles of Integrated Pest Management were also reviewed during the training. Several environmental health staff from counties throughout the state attended the training.

2011 Natural Gas Pipeline Awareness Workshop

ES Robert Duncan participated in the 2011 SMUD (Sacramento Municipal Utility District) Natural Gas Pipeline Emergency Response Awareness Workshop and Tabletop Exercise. Exercise participants included representatives from SMUD, State Department of Fish and Game, Sacramento City Fire Department, Yolo County Environmental Health Department, California Highway Patrol, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Transportation Security Administration, California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, and Pacific Gas and Electric Company.
